

MOCAD was proud to host the memorial of world-renowned poet and political activist **John Sinclair,** husband to photographer Leni Sinclair, in April of 2024.

In November MOCAD partnered with the historic Senate Theater to premiere award-winning filmmaker **dream hampton's** *It Was All A Dream*. MOCAD continues to partner with cultural institutions region wide to produce exciting off-site programming.

Youth

Learning in the galleries at MOCAD happens through curiosity, dialog, play, and experimentation, combining object-based learning with hands-on art-making experiences. Using exhibitions as a vehicle to make meaning together, they encourage students to understand art on their own terms and in community with one another. This year's 4-month Tour program offered 91 students and 12 faculty from Detroit Public Schools an opportunity to engage with MOCAD for free. We are excited to continue this program into the rest of the 2024-2025 school year.

Exhibitions

MOCAD's 2024 exhibitions brought together **9 groundbreaking shows** that bridge the worlds of contemporary art and historic context, underscoring the Museum's unique ability to present cutting-edge works within meaningful, storied settings:

MOCAD's Spring season featured Kinship: The Legacy of Gallery 7, which honors one of Detroit's earliest art venues dedicated to Black artists under the leadership of Charles McGee, LaKela Brown's From Scratch: Seeding Adornment paid homage to the cultivation of local creativity, and Meleko Mokgosi's Zones of Non-Being invites viewers to question the very foundations of identity. Our Fall/Winter 2024 season presented shows like Chris Schanck: A Surreality, ASMA's Wander & Pursuit, and Clare Gatto and Kara Gut's Magic Circle all of which reimagined the legacy of Surrealism, presenting visionary works that blur the lines between reality and imagination while grounding them in art history.

Mike Kelley's Mobile Homestead

In 2024, Mike Kelley's *Mobile Homestead*, a permanent artwork by the late Michigan-born artist Mike Kelley, welcomed over **6,200 visitors**. Serving as a community gallery and gathering space, the *Mobile Homestead* hosted a variety of exhibitions and workshops that enriched Detroit's cultural landscape.



Portal Fire: Shrine of the Torchbearer: An immersive installation that invited visitors to explore themes of transformation and resilience through interactive art forms. The Detroit-based exhibiting artist Levon Kafafian combined their textile-based practice with the speculative worldbuilding of science fiction to take visitors on a journey over one thousand years into the future: to a place and time where digital technology has ceased to exist.

Word of Mouth: This exhibition highlighted the ecosystems that continue to nurture creativity in Detroit, showcasing the vibrant artistic communities within the city. Organized collaboratively by staff from across the Museum, this group exhibition presented a shared space for a diverse range of mediums, levels of experience, and points of exploration.

IMPACT REPORT 2024

Community Care activities at Mike Kelley's Mobile Homestead

MOCAD's Community Care Program Series is an initiative aimed at addressing the diverse needs of the Detroit community by offering workshops, training sessions, and events focused on education, health, and well-being. This program serves as a platform for collective learning, skillsharing, and support, fostering empowerment and resilience within the community.

In 2024, Mobile Homestead hosted sessions covering essential topics such as financial literacy, Narcan training, hypothermia prevention, dandelion medicine, and gender-affirming care with local partners including MSUFCU, Wayne State University, Detroit Recovery Project, and Keep Growing Detroit. These programs highlight the Museum's dedication to holistic community well-being.



Mike Kelley's *Mobile Homestead* remains a dynamic artwork, continually evolving to meet the needs and interests of the Detroit community. It stands as a powerful example of how art can drive social engagement and provide meaningful support.


It is truly heartening to see MOCAD, which has struggled in the past to find its identity as a steward of the arts in Detroit, lean into the real strength of the city: its local artists.

The diversity of Detroit, as well as the strong sense of artistculture feeds into the mission of MOCAD and the goals of this codirectorship. "The Detroit community is so intertwined with a Black culture of creativity, and what better way to enhance those voices than to have people who look like them in these roles," says Madison-Patton. Taking charge of the edgy museum has been a welcome challenge for these women, who want to make MOCAD an accessible resource that champions the city. "At the crux of MOCAD, we center art as a practice for learning, a practice for growing as human beings," says Lynne.

Lynne and Madison-Patton are creating a space that invites all people to engage with the artwork regardless of their level of artistic knowledge.
